SUBJECT: Sickness of Internees.

TO : Commanding General, Eighth Service Command, S.O.S.,  
Santa Fe Building, Dallas, Texas.

1. On or about February 9th a number of cases of diarrhea were noticed among internees of this camp. The number reached approximately eighty who were treated.
2. A board was appointed to investigate this illness but after investigations and inspections by medical and line officers, no definite decision has been reached as to the cause.
3. New water samples have been taken from the stockade which are being sent in for analysis.
4. The situation appears to be under control and all who were sick are either well on the road to recovery or progressing satisfactorily.

1. In compliance with instructions contained in paragraph B-5, Chapter XVI, Tentative Regulations for Civilian Enemy Aliens and Prisoners of War, the following report is submitted:

a. The subject internee died December 6, 1942, at 1712 Z o'clock in the Station Hospital, this Camp.

b. The immediate cause of death was uremia; contributory causes, arterial nephro-sclerosis, cardiac insufficiency.

c. The subject internee arrived at this Camp on May 23, 1942, having been transferred from the Internment Camp at Fort Sam Houston, Texas. He entered the Station Hospital, this Camp, on September 22, 1942 at 1630 Z o'clock, and had been there until his death on December 6, 1942.

Sir: - For the last ten months we have made numerous efforts to collect the amount of money due to us for services rendered (Class 2 labor) at Dodds Field, Fort Sam Houston, Texas, from March to the later part of May 1942. Although this payment was promised to us in the presence of the Swiss Legation Representative by Staff Officers of the 8th Corps Area all our collection efforts up to this date have been in vain. Our constant communication with the General Accounting Office in Washington have been ignored, at least we must assume this is so as no direct reply has ever been made to any of our letters. On or about the early part of December 1942 we were requested by Lt. Brown, the Finance Officer of this Camp, to file a formal request for payment with the General Accounting Office in Washington, shortly afterwards a order for payment was issued to a certain Otto Mempel, A-G-1503, who filed his request for payment at the same time, needed the same endorsements as we did, but our request was completely ignored. - Due to the fact that we are unable to secure any definite information why payment is not made we most respectfully appeal to you, Sir, the Provost Marshal General of the United States Army, for your assistance, so payment, which we are entitled to receive as we earned this money by laboring daily for 14 to 18 hours, shall be made. - All official records, why payment is due, are on file with the Provost Marshal's office in Fort Sam Houston, Texas. - Hoping that you, Sir, will see your way clear to honor our request, we remain,

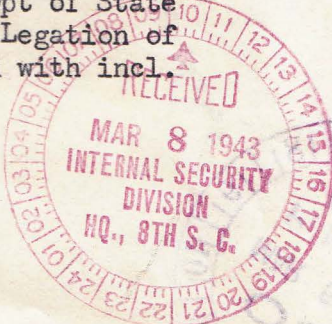
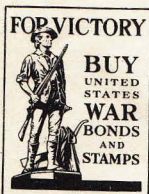

1. Prior to a transfer of interned civilian enemy aliens to the Department of Justice, it is requested that the commanding officer provide for an adjustment with the transferees of any canteen dividends which have accrued to their benefit.

2. The method of adjusting the accrued canteen dividend to benefit the civilian internees responsible for the accumulation is within the discretion of the internment camp commander. The following methods are suggested:

a. Declaring a cash dividend as of the date of transfer for the group as a unit and transferring the cash available for distribution to the canteen at the Immigration and Naturalization Service Alien Internment Camp to which the group is being transferred.

b. Distribute accrued dividends in the form of merchandise on an individual basis.

c. Sponsor a dinner or some other entertainment or group activity enabling the group of transferees as a whole to benefit from their accumulated dividends.

3. For purposes of future references, it is requested further that an itemized record be kept of any adjustments made.

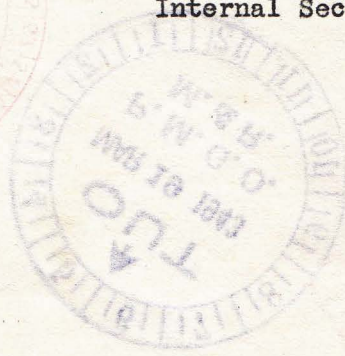
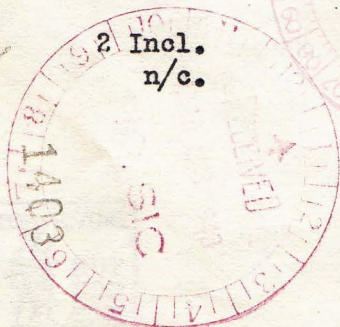
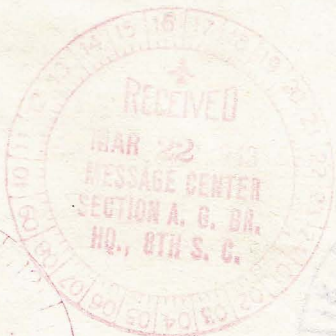

In its memorandum of February 8 the Department of State mentions that the Chief of the Finance Branch of the Aliens Division recently visited the Stringtown Internment Camp, and that it was likely that a satisfactory method of handling the funds would be effected.

It was always understood that the funds of the Legation on deposit with the custodian at Stringtown Internment Camp were properly accounted for and open for inspection by its representatives at all times. On the other hand, it cannot be reconciled that it is extremely difficult to comply with the request of the Legation for receipts and other procedure in connection with these funds, inasmuch as the requirements have consistently been met by the officials at other Army stations such as Camp Forrest, and Fort Meade, as well as by all the officers in charge of camps under the jurisdiction of the Immigration authorities.

In reviewing the records, however, it again appears that no statement of accounting has reached the Legation since the receipt of the vouchers dated January 4, 1943, covering the month of October, 1942, in spite of there having been numerous additional remittances made to the custodian at Stringtown. Having no alternative the Legation feels impelled to submit for consideration and subsequent transmittal to the Commanding officer, two letters in duplicate dated February 12, requesting the forwarding of the much-needed statements as well as a reconciliation statement for the balance on hand

My dear Colonel Frankenberger:

I am inclosing herewith an extract copy of a letter dated January 6, 1943, received from the Legation of Switzerland, Division of German Interests, which is self-explanatory. I shall appreciate it very much if you will see that these matters are properly taken care of with the least practicable delay.

In connection with the handling of these funds, I would like to make the following suggestion, namely, that each remittance from the Legation of Switzerland be handled in its entirety, that is, if you receive a remittance of \$400 for pocket money in any one month, that you require the group leader or leaders to prepare a proper voucher or vouchers containing appropriate receipts, in triplicate, from each internee benefiting from the fund and that this voucher or vouchers be presented to the officer issuing the canteen coupons at the time the issues are actually made. The receipt could then be mailed immediately to the Legation of Switzerland and the transaction closed. The balance, if any, remaining from the remittance of \$400 could either be returned to the Legation of Switzerland or deposited in the camp fund and applied on the next voucher. In the event a supplemental voucher would be necessary in any one month for the purpose of paying newly arrived internees, it appears that it could be handled in the same manner.

Connell will be down your way in about a week and he will be glad to discuss this matter with you with a view toward figuring out a solution to your problem.

Sir:

I take the liberty to avail myself of your kind offer to approach you direct in matters where your intervention would be essential to overcome certain difficulties in connection with Internment Camps under the jurisdiction of the U.S. Army Authorities.

In this respect, I wish to submit copy of my letter of December 18, 1942 addressed to Lt. A.N. Brown, 1st Lt., Cav.(8th S.C.), Custodian, Enemy Alien Fund, Stringtown Internment Camp, Stringtown, Oklahoma, dealing with the handling of funds placed at the disposal of the Camp Authorities of Stringtown Internment Camp by this Department for the purpose of making monthly payments of pocket money to needy German internees in the amount of \$4.--. Inasmuch as no reply has been forthcoming, this step has become unavoidable to ask your Office to speed up the matter, particularly since the discrepancies

referred to in our letter, which is self-explanatory, have so far created great inconvenience to our Book-keeping Department which could not close its books due to that fact.

I also attach copy of a letter sent to Lt. Colonel Bertram Frankenberger, Commanding Officer, Stringtown Internment Camp, from which you will see that our checks No.90 for \$400.00 and No.91 for \$10.00, issued on December 18, 1942, have not been presented for collection as yet. The reasons given for this was that, inasmuch as we required receipt in duplicate for the check, a triplicate would have to be presented to the Camp Authorities for their own records. Such action may no doubt have appeared warranted under these circumstances, but it is felt here that keeping the matter in abeyance without making any communication to this Department for a considerable length of time could have been avoided.

It also appears that at Camp Forrest a check for \$620.- sent on November 30, 1942 so far has not been cleared, and I beg to direct your attention to the attached copy of my letter of today to Colonel McClung. In this instance it is worth mentioning that no receipts to be signed in duplicate by the internees have so far been received for amounts turned over to the Authorities



at Camp Forrest around the middle of November.

I am fully aware that the actual reason for noncollection of these checks may be due to the fact that new regulations were issued concerning the handling of funds of internees. Without going into details, however, I presume that such regulations should not affect the policy so far pursued in the handling of these Swiss funds which, when deposited with the respective Camp Authorities, are still being held by them in the name of the Legation of Switzerland, Department of German Interests, which is fully licensed to handle all financial transactions within the United States in connection with the representation of German interests. I, therefore, see no reason in the delay of the collection of the checks and consequently disbursement to the internees of the pocket money.

I thank you very much for your cooperation you may lend in this matter.

Dear Sir:

This is in reply to your wire of July 30, as well as to your various letters of July 13, (3) and July 16.

Please be informed that the list of the people who have not as yet been permitted to depart has been received, and that we shall make use of this information in connection with all further problems which may come up regarding repatriation, or possibly reunion with the respective families. There is nothing that can be done at this point regarding the clearing up of an apparent error when listing certain names for the sailing of the "SS DROTTNINGHOLM III", inasmuch as no further repatriation possibilities are evident at this time.

We regret to advise you that this Department has not the technical facilities for transmitting messages on behalf of internees through official channels; and Mr. Alfred Braeuchle, Sr., and his son will have to rely on the general mailing facilities which are at their disposal, and which by now should function without too much delay inasmuch as this problem has the continued attention of the authorities here.

We have taken due note that you have been appointed group speaker for the groups from Costa Rica, Guatemala and Panama.

As far as conditions in Costa Rica are concerned, we have again arranged for a complete investigation by wire through the Spanish Embassy, and trust that we will hear something definite before long.

With regard to the money situation, we would appreciate your giving us a more accurate picture of the actual requirements. You may know that the German Government has authorized regular monthly payments of \$4.00 as pocket money to those internees who have decided to be repatriated. Please inform us, therefore, whether any pocket money is being disbursed by the American authorities there, and whether the provision for pocket money mentioned by us should be applied to any of your men.

The Spanish Embassy has been furnished with lists of all the men from Central and South America who have left on the former exchange vessel on July 15. This procedure should permit all the families to ascertain which men are still being held in this country.

The letters from Mr. Wilhelm Probst and Mr. Otto Klemm addressed to the Immigration and Naturalization Service in Philadelphia, have been referred to this Department for consideration. In the meantime, both these gentlemen have been contacted directly by us; and before taking any further steps with regard to the reunion of the families, we shall await their decision as to whether they agree to a possible repatriation of their families.

In the meantime, you will probably have been notified that the following relatives of the members of the Panama Group have left on the third sailing of the "SS DROTTNINGHOLM":

1. In the first paragraph, basic communication dated July 8, 1942, you request information as to whether or not internees employed as doctors, pharmacists, and male nurses in the hospital can receive credit at the rate of eighty (80¢) per day. This type of employment is labor incident to improving or providing the health of the internees and as such is generally considered to come within class one labor. However, the third sentence of the Regulations, Civilian Enemy Aliens and Prisoners of War, Chapter X, Section A, 1-a, page 36, reads:

"This labor will not be paid for except, as authorized by the camp commander, in instances where a few internees will devote so much time to this type of work that it will prevent them, as distinguished from the majority of the internees in the company or camp, from engaging in class two work."

3. Favorable decision as to credit allowance of eighty cents a day for internees performing this type of work is requested. From the above quoted sentence you are authorized to pay persons employed as doctors, pharmacists, and male nurses eighty (80¢) per day.

2. In the second and third paragraphs you recommend that internees performing regular work such as cooks, cooks' helpers, kitchen police, etc., be credited at the rate of eighty (80¢) per day. This type of work comes within the same class as the work referred to in the paragraph above. Cooks and cooks' helpers are clearly included in the class who should receive pay. Kitchen police should be furnished by detail, and this work should be apportioned among all the internees, hence it is not believed that the kitchen police should receive pay.

This office recently has been granted an additional appropriation for the purpose of purchasing athletic and recreational equipment for internment camps and, in order that the procurement may be used to provide the maximum suitable equipment, the cooperation of the internment camp commanders is desired to determine the types of equipment most suitable for the internees at each camp.

2. Reports received since the original shipment of kits to internment camps indicate that some equipment was included which was not desired by certain classes of internees, for example, it was reported that internees at some camps were not interested in baseball. Therefore, a list of proposed types of equipment to be procured is inclosed for remarks and recommendations, and it is desired especially that equipment in which the internees have no interest be indicated in order that kits may be made up accordingly.

3. It is suggested that, to determine the most suitable types of equipment, the internees, through their spokesmen, be allowed to state their preferences and that both indoor and outdoor equipment be considered for internees according to their nationality and age. It is intended that the proposed kits contain a wide variety of equipment to satisfy the recreational desires of all classes of internees and the inclosed list is merely offered as a suggestion. Other types may be procured when deemed advisable in view of the number of requests received. Hence, it is desired that any type of equipment omitted from the list and which is desired by the internees, be recommended to this office.





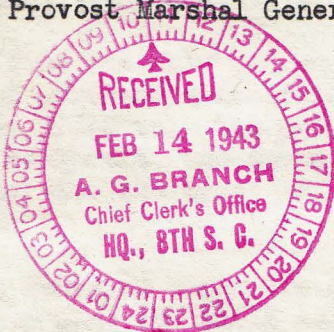

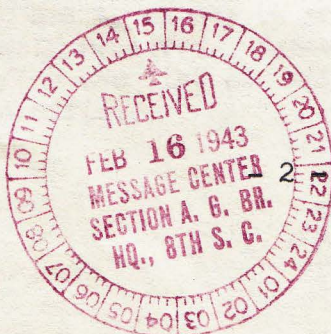

1. Attention is invited to paragraph 2, Section A, Chapter VI, Internee Regulations, wherein it is specified that internee clothing will be stenciled in white.

2. In compliance with the above regulation a white oil paint with a lead base has been used for stenciling internee clothing at this Camp, but it has proved to be quite unsatisfactory. When the clothes are laundered, the paint is quite easily removed and in addition it can be rubbed off by various methods. This occurs all too frequently and necessitates re-stenciling. White paint on white clothing is entirely unsatisfactory due to the difficulty in reading the numbers at a distance.

3. In order to overcome the second difficulty mentioned above this Headquarters has been using a black indelible ink for stenciling light colored clothes and it has proved to be very satisfactory. Black indelible ink should be authorized for light colored or white clothing.

4. An effort has also been made to secure a white indelible ink but the Appelgate Chemical Company, Chicago, Illinois, has informed this Headquarters that they do not manufacture such an ink and have never found a white ink that is at all indelible.

5. The McAlester State Penitentiary, McAlester, Oklahoma, has furnished the information that an orange colored paint with a zinc base cannot be removed from clothing during the laundering process. Although this type of paint has not been used on any clothing at this Camp, it is believed that its adoption would overcome the difficulty mentioned in paragraph 2 of this letter.

On questioning him it was learned that neither Mr. Roth of the Swiss Legation nor Mr. Herrick of the State Department would visit this camp.

2. Mr. Bruppacker arrived this camp at 10:00 A.M., October 19, 1942. He stated that this was not a scheduled trip but that he had just dropped in to check up on things in general and what cooperation was being effected by internees with respect to their promises to him on his last visit, or words to this effect. A number of questions were taken up with Mr. Bruppacker by the Camp Commander, among which the following are outlined:

a. Conduct of internees during darkness when electric current was off at this camp.

b. The failure of the internees to cooperate fully in details involving Class "1" labor.

c. Innoculation against typhoid and vaccination against smallpox which a number of the internees may be expected to refuse.

d. Non-cooperation of some to the internees turning out for 8:00 A.M. checkup by the Officer of the Day.

Other details in connection with the camp were discussed and it is believed camp authorities have Mr. Bruppacker's full sympathy in the handling of these problems and that he will use his influence in talking to the leaders while here this date in trying to correct these details.

3. Mr. Bruppacker stated that he merely intended to look around the camp and it was suggested that he talk to the leaders which he is going to do. He started his inspection of the stockade accompanied by Captain Nicks and the Camp Surgeon at 11:10 A.M., October 19, 1942.

Mr. Bruppacker took up the matter of finances regarding the

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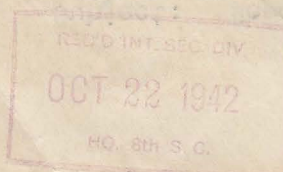

3. It is desired that special consideration be given to the policing of your camp, prior to their arrival. Personnel should be warned to be on the alert and show proper respect to Dr. Habicht. It is important that a favorable impression be made because of possible retaliation after reports of this inspection are furnished to enemy countries.

The Provost Marshal General has directed me to reply to your communication dated November 20, 1942, SD 740.00115, re: European War 1939/5101, inclosing a copy of a memorandum dated November 11, 1942, from the Legation of Switzerland, Washington, D. C., concerning a complaint made by an internee at Stringtown Internment Camp in regard to inoculation of internees for typhoid.

The Commanding Officer, Stringtown Internment Camp, has reported that on October 18, 1942, the Commanding Officer, Camp McCoy Internment Camp, was requested to forward records as to the treatment of a limited number of internees for whom no information concerning vaccination of smallpox and inoculation with triple typhoid vaccine had reached Stringtown Internment Camp. It was then found that immunization records were incomplete necessitating, in the judgment of the medical officers, vaccination and inoculation in these cases. A similar practice prevails with regard to United States troops. Discomfort to a relative few under the circumstances is slight in comparison with jeopardizing the health of the many.

An investigation was conducted as to the use of hypodermic needles. The investigation revealed that medical officers sterilized, before using, all needles and syringes and that only one needle was used per internee. The records at Stringtown Internment Camp show that no severe reactions, infection or sickness were brought to the attention of the medical officers following typhoid inoculations and smallpox vaccinations.

As each internee is initially vaccinated and inoculated, efforts will be made to assure a proper entry is made on his immunization register and that the immunization register will accompany the internee at any subsequent transfer to avoid repeated vaccination and inoculation. However, in the few isolated instances that may occur in which the records are either unavailable or incomplete and a

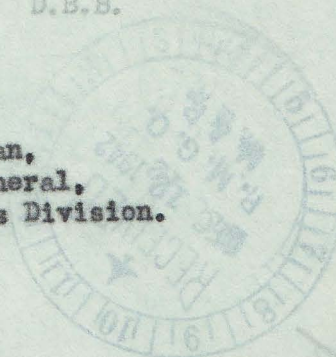

HEADQUARTERS, STRINGTOWN INTERNMENT CAMP, Stringtown, Oklahoma. Dec. 5, 1942. To: The Provost Marshal General, U. S. Army, Washington, D.C. (Thru: Eighth Service Command, S.O.S., Santa Fe Building, Dallas, Tex.)

1. The records of the Camp show that every effort has and is being made to secure data from former camps which housed internees of this camp.
2. This camp had a record of internees from Camp Blanding. There were two hundred and sixty-two internees received from Camp Blanding.
3. There has been one case to date where due to an oversight, an internee has received vaccination and inoculation when he had had it before. This case was from Blanding. This case has in no way suffered from the extra treatment.
4. This camp has contacted Camp McCoy and the answer being so indefinite, no consideration has been or will be given to it. Copy of this letter with indorsements is hereto attached. The mere statement contained in Paragraph 2 of 2nd indorsement from Camp McCoy, to the effect that is is believed that each internee had received the treatment, is considered no record at all. They evidently had no records on which to base a positive report and there are too many internees and service personnel involved to consider the case otherwise.
5. It is believed that with the exception of the case noted





above, no duplication treatments have been given and efforts are still in effect trying to secure additional data as to records in this connection.

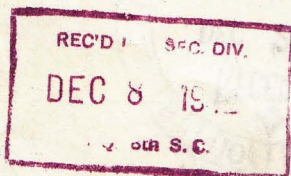
6. The matter of a sick internee being subjected to inoculation is false. The camp medical officers have determined in all cases of doubt. One case, and it is believed the one case at point, was an internee who has ashtma. The doctors pronounced him wholly qualified for the treatment and as a matter of fact, his general health improved after he had had his inoculation against typhoid, but it should be noted, that the internee leader did not report this improvement although he did report that a sick internee had been forced to take inoculation.

7. In protecting the health of this command, a lenient attitude as suggested by the Swiss Legation, cannot be tolerated beyond certain limits. As is stated, a small group of people are involved. True perhaps, but a small group may be the medium through which a majority could be caused to suffer.

8. It is believed that the matter of use of hypodermic needle was discussed with the representative while here. From investigation, the medical officers here consider that proper precautions were taken. Proof is that no infection of any sort has been in evidence and statement of the medical officer on this subject is hereto attached.

9. No cause of shock due to reaction have been noted by the medical officers of this camp.

10. Attention is invited to the fact that in most recent days, Internee Leader Hach has submitted several wires that are based on fantastic and overdrawn thoughts as to mail. It is believed that in considering complaints, the sources should be catalogued as to authenticity. That representatives of the Swiss Legation should give the Army Medical Authorities at least a fifty-fifty break with the word of an internee who may be representing the worst trouble making element of a camp.

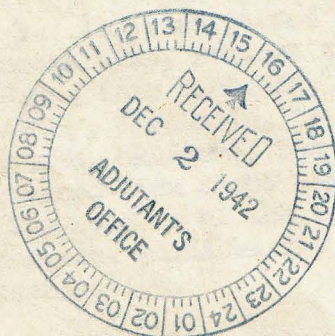
1. This report is in compliance with verbal order, The Commanding Officer, Stringtown Internment Camp, in reference to letter from The Provost Marshal General and enclosed memorandum from the Swiss Legation, Subject: Inoculation of Internees, dated November 25, 1942.

2. In regard to paragraph (2) of said letter, the following information is furnished:

(1) All needles and syringes used in Typhoid inoculation of internees have been properly sterilized before being used and one needle only has been used per internee.

(2) Vaccination and Inoculation of sick internees: These procedures have not been practiced on internees who were sick or in condition that in the judgement of the medical officers it would be harmful to them.

(3) There have been no severe reaction, infection or sickness brought to the attention of the medical officers, this camp, following Typhoid inoculation and Smallpox vaccination.

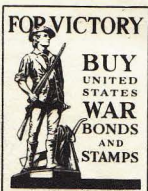

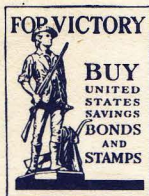

MEMORANDUM

The Legation of Switzerland in charge of German interests begs to refer to a wire just received from Mr. Otto Hach, Spokesman for Company No. 1 at the Stringtown Internment Camp, Stringtown, Oklahoma. The matter discussed therein deals with the vaccinations against typhoid being performed on all internees.

This was the subject of a discussion during the recent visit to Stringtown by a representative of the Legation, since it appeared that a group of men refused to be inoculated for a second time because they had undergone such a treatment at their previous stations of confinement at Camp Blanding and Camp McCoy. At the time of the inspection it was recommended that the internees be tolerant of the vaccinations inasmuch as they were only being done for their fullest protection, but it now seems that the Spokesmen in this as in many other instances do not have the influence desired.

The communication referred to deals with a request that the entire measure be stopped provisionally until the records of those who were previously inoculated become available

available. It seems that also even sick internees are being forced to submit to inoculations. In view of the refusal to be vaccinated a second time within a relatively short period, knowing the shock it causes, it would appear that a somewhat more lenient attitude could be taken and the matter made the subject of an immediate investigation, during which time all further treatment be suspended, particularly since only a small group of people are involved.

At this occasion the attention of the proper authorities is also drawn to the fact that a protest was filed with regard to the practice followed during the typhoid vaccination. It would appear that the same needle was used eight to twelve times without being disinfected, and that it was only cleaned with some cotton wadding soaked in alcohol. Since there are some infectious diseases prevalent among these people it would seem that more precautionary measures could be used.

This request is being submitted to the Department of State as it was received by the Legation for whatever consideration it may deserve.

1. Reference is made to your letter dated November 11, 1942, on this subject. Internees will be treated in the same manner as Army personnel. Taking vaccinations and inoculations is obligatory and is done for the mutual health of the internee and his fellow internees as well as that of the Army personnel who come in contact with them.

2. Since vaccinations and inoculations are unqualifiedly compulsory, reasonable and necessary force will be used to accomplish same on those who refuse one or the other or both.

3. In view of the foregoing, no punishment is necessary for non-compliance. Disciplinary measures within the discretion of the internment camp commander and not in conflict with the Geneva Convention may be taken against those who because of their refusal had to be vaccinated and/or inoculated by means of physical force.

My dear Colonel Bryan:

I am inclosing copies of letters which are self-explanatory. If the letter to Mr. Bruppacher has gone, and I think it did, it slipped through our headquarters as it came in sealed and evidently slipped by or through two checking agencies here.

In order that you will be familiar with its contents before it gets to you, I am writing to let you know that no force other than moral suasion by word of mouth has been used on any internee to make him submit to inoculation or vaccination. This case I have discussed with the surgeon and all that happened was they told him he would have to take it, and he did.

I understand several other letters are being prepared by internees to the Swiss Legation on the same subject, which we will forward as soon as we get them.

As far as I am concerned, they will have to take the inoculations as we discussed when you were here.

I have not heard from you officially as yet, as to punishment for not taking the shots or vaccination.

Monday November 2nd 1942.

I have been vaccinated against my will today once against Smallpox (left arm) and once against Typhoid (right arm).

I have been lying in bed for several days with a heavy attack of asthma. Although I finally fell asleep and rested a little, I was awakened by a soldier who had my name on his list of internees to be vaccinated. I told him, and he saw, that I could hardly be moved in this condition but he insisted this being his order which had to be filled. Our Company Commander, Mr. Otto Mack, kindly took the matter in his hands and also explained to said soldier my condition (When I am suffering from Asthma I can hardly talk, walk, eat etc and the least excitement does me more harm than good.)

Arriving at the Hospital in spite of the above mentioned protests, I immediately mentioned to the physicians that all my doctors as well in Germany, Switzerland and here in the U.S.A. told me to be awfully careful with any vaccinations and injections, even in case of a serious accident, I should not take Tetanus. I asked for at least 8 days postponement so I would be then entirely over my attack and in a far better bodily shape. Furthermore I like to state that Dr. Smith, who took care of us while in Fort Sam Houston, told me personally that he would not take said vaccinations IN MY CASE and consequently sent me away at that time. He is fully aware of this statement.

With all these arguments I was vaccinated as stated above and told by Col. Dr. Anderson: "Who told you that ( meaning my physicians advice ) are outside doctors, we have the say here, besides there are five good doctors here who can take care of you in case something should go wrong." Taking fully advantage of my asthmatic and sick condition - I had to stand up and was not offered a chair - and under threat of severe punishment in case of a refusal the said vaccinations were executed.

A few weeks ago all internees were called over to the Recreation Hall and every one who did not want to be vaccinated was asked to sign a written statement. I did this, explaining my specific reasons. Today, however, Lt. Dr. Donnayen told me frank in my face that I rejected the vaccinations ( I never had changed a word in my life with one of the physicians ) and that they told me the whole procedure is "must" and an order. This has never been explained to me while in the Recreation Hall.

The present doctors also made the following statement: "These shots will help you over your attack. They even will keep you from getting some more attacks in the near future". I think, that I should know after 28 years of Asthma what will help me over an attack and the very remote chances of said possibility.

I like to have this report - for order's sake - to be put in my file. I fully resent the raw and absolutely cruel execution of the whole procedure under the motto "a military order" against which an internee is of course utterly helpless. With the same reason and under the same conditions doctors are able to do anything with me.--
